

The provisions of this brochure describe the design of barriers for residential swimming pools, spas and hot tubs installed on the premises of a detached one- or two-family dwelling, or a one-family townhouse not more than three stories in height, for the sole use of residents and invited guests at the single-family dwelling/townhouse.

For the purpose of this brochure, a swimming pool is any structure intended for swimming or recreational bathing that contains *water over 24 inches (610 mm) deep.* This includes in-ground, aboveground and on-ground swimming pools, hot tubs and spas. Swimming pools greater than 5000 gallons and/or not located entirely aboveground require permits.

How big is 5000 gallons? There are 7.48 gallons of water in a cubic foot. A 12' x 24' pool 3' deep holds about 6,500 gallons of water.

For round pools:

Pool Barriers

OUTDOOR POOLS -An outdoor swimming pool, including an in-ground, aboveground or an ground pool, bot tub or

on-ground pool, hot tub or spa containing water over 24 inches deep shall be provided with a barrier which shall comply with the following:



1. The top of the barrier shall be at least 48 inches (1219 mm) above grade measured on the side

measured on the side of the barrier which faces away from the

swimming pool. The maximum vertical clearance between grade and the bottom of the barrier shall be 2 inches (51 mm) measured on the side of the barrier which

faces away from the swimming pool. Where the top of the pool structure is above grade, such as an aboveground pool, the barrier may be at ground level,



such as the pool structure, or mounted on top of the pool structure. Where the barrier is mounted on top of the pool structure, the maximum vertical clearance between the top of the pool structure and the bottom of the barrier shall be 4 inches (102 mm).

 Openings in the barrier shall not allow passage of a 4-inchdiameter (102 mm) sphere.



3. Solid barriers which do not have openings, such as a

such as a masonryor stone wall, shall not contain indentations or protrusions except for pormal construction



normal construction

tolerances and tooled masonry joints.

4. Where the barrier is composed of horizontal and vertical members and the distance

between the tops of the horizontal members is less than 45 inches (1143 mm), the horizontal members shall be located on the swimming pool side of the fence. Spacing between vertical members shall



not exceed 1.75 inches (44 mm) in width. Where there are decorative cutouts within vertical members, spacing within the cutouts shall not exceed 1.75 inches (44 mm) in width.

5. Where the barrier is composed of horizontal and vetical members and the distance between the tops of the horizontal members is 45 inches (1143 mm) or more, spacing



between vertical members shall not exceed 4 inches (102 mm). Where there are decorative cutouts within vertical members, spacing within the cutouts shall not exceed 1.75 inches (44 mm) in width.

6. Maximum mesh size for chain link fences shall be a 2.25-inch (57 mm) square unless the fence is provided with slats fastened at the top or the bottom which reduce the openings to not more than 1.75 inches (44 mm)



7. Where the barriers composed of diagonal members, such as a lattice former the

fence, the maximum opening formed by the diagonal members shall not be more than



1.75 inches (44 mm).

8. Access gates shall comply with the above seven requirements and shall be equipped to accommodate

a locking device. Pedestrian access gates shall open outward away from the pool and shall be selfclosing and have a self-latching device. Gates other than pedestrian access gates shall have a selflatching device.



Where the release mechanism of the selflatching device is located less than 54 inches (1372 mm) from the bottom of the gate, the release mechanism and openings shall comply with the following:

- a) The release mechanism shall be located on the pool side of the gate at least 3 inches (76 mm) below the top of the gate, and
- b) The gate and barrier shall have no opening greater than 0.5 inches (12.7 mm) within 18 inches (457 mm) of the release mechanism.



- 9. Where a wall of a dwelling serves as part of the barrier one of the following conditions shall be met:
 - The pool shall be equipped with a powered safety cover in compliance with ASTM F1346; or
 - All doors with direct access to the pool through that wall shall be equipped with an alarm which produces an audible warning when the door and its screen, if present, are opened. The alarm shall sound continuously for a

minimum of 30 seconds immediately after the door is opened and be capable of being heard throughout the



house during normal house-hold activities. The alarm shall automatically reset under all conditions. The alarm system shall be equipped with a manual means, such as touchpad or switch, to temporarily deactivate the alarm for a single opening. Such deactivation shall last for not more than 15 seconds. The deactivation switch(es) shall be located at least 54 inches (1372 mm) above the threshold of the door; or

- c) Other means of protection, such as self-closing doors with self-latching devices, which are approved by the governing body, shall be acceptable so long as the degree of protection afforded is not less than the protection afforded by Items a) and b) above.
- 10. Where an aboveground pool structure is used as a barrier or where the barrier is mounted on top of the pool structure, and the means of access is a ladder or steps, then:
 - a) The ladder or steps shall be capable of being secured, locked or removed to prevent access, or
 - b) The ladder or steps shall be surrounded by a barrier which meets the requirements of items 1 through 9 above. When the ladder or steps are secured, locked or removed, any opening created shall not allow the passage of a 4-inch-diameter (102 mm) sphere.



INDOOR POOLS - All walls surrounding an indoor swimming pool containing water over 24 inches deep shall comply with item 9 above.



Prohibited Locations

Barriers shall be located so as to prohibit permanent structures, equipment or similar objects from being used to climb the barriers.

Barrier Exceptions

Spas or hot tubs with a safety cover complying with ASTM F1346 shall be exempt from the provisions of this appendix.

Additional Permits

Permits for pool equipment are also required. i.e; pool heaters, LPG tanks, gas piping. Seperate inspections are required for the installation of this equipment.
